1. Introduction

1.1 Background

The 3rd CISE Stakeholder Group (CSG) meeting took place at EMSA on 13 February 2020. The meeting was convened by the CSG Chairman Mr Leendert Bal, EMSA.

The following CSG Member States and institutions were represented at the meeting: Belgium, Bulgaria, Croatia, Cyprus, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Ireland, Italy, Norway, Portugal, Romania, Spain, The Netherlands, European Defence Agency (EDA), European External Action Service (EEAS), European Fisheries Control Agency (EFCA), European Border and Coast Guard Agency (Frontex), European Union Satellite Centre (SatCen), European Commission Joint Research Centre (JRC) and European Commission DG MARE (the full list of participants is in the Annex 5.1).

2. Meeting session

2.1 Welcome and logistics

Leendert Bal, Head of Department Safety, Security and Surveillance, welcomed all Member States and agencies to the third meeting of the CISE Stakeholder Group (CSG).

The agenda was adopted (see section 5.2).

2.2 Opening session

Christos Economou, COM-DG MARE, noted that also for this third CSG meeting there was an increased number of attendees and that it reflects the increased interest in CISE in general.

The process to transfer the Intellectual Property Rights (IPR) from the EUCISE2020 project to the Commission is not yet finalised. Two EUCISE2020 partners have still not signed the transfer agreement. The Commission will address these partners individually. Mr Economou pointed out that regardless of this issue, much has already been achieved since the start of the transitional phase: the operational support for technical issues is in place and the first version of the cooperation agreement is drafted. On the background of the delayed transfer of IPR, the Commission has provisionally extended the duration of the transitional phase from April 2021 to October 2021.

Mr Economou provided a state of play for the Security Study, where the Commission is in the final stage of procuring the contractor. After completion of the procedure, the result will be communicated to the CSG members. The study will last 15 months and will cover all aspects of data sharing through CISE for classified, sensitive and unclassified information.

Communication was addressed by Mr Economou as a very important part of the transitional phase to demonstrate what is done in CISE. CSG members should be encouraged to share with others the website set up by EMSA.

Mr Economou announced that EMSA has been selected to organise a dedicated workshop on CISE during the European Maritime Day in Cork, Ireland, on 14-15 May 2020, and that this event will be a good opportunity to promote CISE.

Mr Bal, in his comment to these opening statements, first emphasized the need to progress on the IPR transfer and noted that already 10 months of the transitional phase have been spent. Secondly, regarding the security study, Mr Bal mentioned that EMSA recently had undergone and passed a data protection audit from the European Commission, demonstrating that EMSA has a security preparedness also relating to classified information.

2.3 European Coast Guard Functions Forum (ECGF) workshop

Ronan Chastanet, CSG member of France and speaking also in capacity as a representative of the current French Chairmanship of the European Coast Guard Functions Forum (ECGFF), provided a summary of the joint ECGFF/EMSA workshop “Information Sharing and Data Security in the Maritime Safety and Security Domains”, which had been delivered at EMSA premises on 11-12 February 2020, back-to-back with the CSG meeting. Upon initiative of the French chair, Data Sharing had been included as one of three themes in the agenda for the workshop, the other two being Cyber Security and RPAS implementation. As part of the Data Sharing theme, CISE had been discussed from different points of views and presented by different surveillance actors representing several sectors (i.e. navy, customs, maritime security and safety etc.). The French customs delivered a presentation on data sharing and Greece shared useful information on how EU financing could be used to develop adaptors, support connectivity and to create a CISE environment step by step. Other presentations had dealt with issues such as the concept of Responsibility to Share, the CISE connectivity to MARSUR and how Copernicus information could be integrated in CISE.

In total, 120 participants had attended the workshop, representing EU/EEA representatives from several sectors, three intergovernmental organisations and a high number of agencies. Mr Chastanet concluded that as a result of the inclusion of CISE in the agenda, the CGF community had now started discussing CISE in a much wider extent than had previously been the case.

2.4 Transitional phase activities

EMSA provided an update on the status of the activities defined for the project and the time plan for their completion. A revised overview of the CISE network was presented.

Related to the time plan for the project, it was noted that some activities that rely on the transfer of IPR had been delayed, but that the activities that are not depending on the transfer of IPR are on track.

The tentative dates for the 2020 CSG meetings, with the 4th CSG meeting planned for the 9 June 2020 and the 5th CSG meeting for the 15 October 2020, were noted.

Questions & Answers

DE	Germany reminded members of the standardization process in ETSI (European Telecommunications Standards Institute). Germany encouraged those CSG members that are public authorities to contact their national ETSI point of contact, as a State’s membership in ETSI can be delegated within that State to a specific authority. Germany further called on EMSA to participate in the work as it relates to the CISE technical specifications and expressed their appreciation to JRC for their contribution to the work.
EMSA	Mr Bal invited Germany to share, if possible, any documents to the CSG members that could help them better understand the work in ETSI and to help in the internal decision making for their possible participation.
JRC	The JRC referred to their presentation made under agenda item 2.10 Standardisation at the 2nd CSG meeting and explained that most documents being processed in ETSI are still in draft version and that it may not be possible to share them at this stage. One of the next phases could allow for consulting the CSG.
FR	France expressed that the CSG should take into account the work conducted in other CISE related projects, either by inviting their representatives to a CSG meeting to inform about their activities, or to synchronise best practices workshops or training.
EMSA	Mr Bal informed that EMSA had already intended to address this issue, and proposed to the CSG to invite representatives of other relevant CISE related projects to the 4th CSG meeting.

BG	Bulgaria expressed support to the proposal made by EMSA and their support in general to liaise with others to make sure that EU funded projects move in the same direction, in order to ensure that the industry is on board and to avoid creating separate CISE networks.
DE	Germany seconded Bulgaria, adding that it would be helpful if EMSA could publish on their website a list of other projects with CISE relation.
IT	Italy noted that projects under OCEAN2020 are different, as they are implemented in the defence sector, and that attention must be paid to CISE goals versus projects' goals. In any case, if a project has a technical part, the direction should be pointed out to avoid that industry drives it in another direction.
DG MARE	Mr Economou noted that this issue was addressed during the 2nd CSG meeting and that there is a consensus that different initiatives should be brought together. It is a question of how public money is spent and how we make added value of it. The exchange of knowledge can be more in depth with a best practice workshop where one party is more advanced than others, or to invite representatives to a CSG meeting to provide an overview. Mr Economou further reminded that some of the CSG members are involved in other projects and that they should have a coherent position in all fora.
PT	Portugal informed that they are involved in MARINEO, an innovative project for observation, monitoring and maritime surveillance, ending in November 2020, and offered to share information if requested.
EMSA	Mr Bal explained that if CSG members inform EMSA, then EMSA can help sharing information, without guaranteeing completeness. Mr Bal invited all CSG members to send to EMSA before 28 February 2020 the title and a contact person of other projects that they would like the CSG to be familiarized with.

2.5 Best Practices Workshop

Peter Kirov, Bulgaria, provided a summary and reflection of the results from the first Best Practices Workshop that was held at EMSA premises in Lisbon on 11 December 2019.

EMSA presented some additional conclusions, including organisational recommendations for future sessions. CSG members took note of the indicative dates for the coming workshops in 2020: 25 March, 1 July and 4 November. While the workshop on 25 March will be a training for node administrators, the topics are yet to be decided for the latter sessions. CSG member were encouraged to provide suggestions of trainings or workshops they might have.

2.6 Test Campaign

Luigi Ciani, Italy, presented the plan for the conduction of the Test Campaign. The presentation was based on the Discussion Paper that had been sent to the CSG members ahead of the meeting.

Questions & Answers

BG	Bulgaria, not being able to confirm their participation during this test campaign, suggested a two-phase approach where those nodes prevented from participating at this stage can participate later.

PT	Portugal asked whether it was possible to be provided a service catalogue.
IT	Italy, in response to Portugal, confirmed that this will be part of the analysis to be done during the next weeks.
DG MARE	<p>DG MARE, with reference to the suggestion made by Bulgaria, expressed an interest in learning more about who will participate in the test campaign, and how a possible two-phase campaign could be conducted.</p> <p>DG MARE also noted that it is important to follow the test campaign nationally, as it will give a clear idea where technical consolidation is needed. The test campaign will help identify what is needed to succeed with the use of CISE towards the operational phase.</p>
EMSA	EMSA clarified that the campaign will be conducted together with those ready to start. Results will be analysed and reported back to the CSG to discuss next steps. Test campaigns will need to be done at a regular basis. In addition, EMSA has been receiving requests to further tests based on use cases. A number of use cases were created during EUCISE2020, such use cases need to be reviewed and validated. The test campaign task force will finally define the plan for the first campaign, if possible it may overlap the MARSEC exercise organized by the Spanish navy. Any states interested in participating are welcome.
PT	Portugal informed that they are interested in participating in MARSEC 20 but that they need a formal invitation from Spain.
FR	France informed that, within the framework of the ECGFF, COASTEX will take place in Toulon on 2-5 June 2020 under coordination of the French maritime authorities. The exercise will include different types of scenarios and activate several sets of coastal organisations from different countries. Assets (pollution response equipment, drones, satellite images etc) from EMSA, Frontex and EFCA could be included. CISE connections could also be included.

2.7 Cooperation Agreement

EMSA provided an update on the ongoing work in the Cooperation Agreement Working Group. A first draft of the CA had been shared with the WG and a first VTC (meeting in Microsoft Teams) had been conducted on 7 February 2020. WG members had agreed to provide their comments by 28 February 2020. EMSA informed that it had been suggested in the WG that the Responsibility to Share should at least initially not be addressed in the CA. RTS could be eventually incorporated in the CA at a second phase when the obligations of the RTS have been defined.

Questions & Answers

BG	Bulgaria referred to a slide in the presentation about the Legacy systems and reminded that CISE is not only about surveillance but also about information exchange. There are different data bases, for example a database for registered seafarers, that needs to be taken into account.
IT	Italy expressed that it was interesting to see the inclusion of the classification of information between users.
DE	Germany questioned the reference to CONFIDENTIAL information and advised that we should keep to RESTRICTED.
EMSA	Mr Bal, in response to Germany, noted that the topic had been presented as an issue to be discussed in the working group, but agreed that the CONFIDENTIAL layer is not likely to be relevant at this stage.

	On a principal note, Mr Bal further noted that the list of members to the working group showed that not all CSG members are involved, and that it would be very unfortunate if members are not informed and then come back with late comments. CSG members are all encouraged to have at least one lawyer involved in the process.
DG MARE	Mr Economou seconded to EMSA and expressed the importance that all members are involved. It could be useful make the draft available also to those members who are not involved in the working group, to keep them informed.
EMSA	Mr Bal confirmed that the process will be kept transparent and that the CSG will be informed, without replicating the working group discussion there.

2.8 Responsibility to Share

EMSA presented the proposed plan for the Responsibility to Share (RTS) activity, including a suggested timeline, and requested members to nominate members to working group.

Questions & Answers

EL	Greece mentioned that they are interested in participating to the working group but that they will come back to confirm.
DG MARE	DG MARE asked how RTS will be addressed in the Cooperation Agreement WG.
EMSA	EMSA explained, with reference to the discussion about the Cooperation Agreement [section 2.7 above], that the relation to RTS will be decided at a later stage in the Cooperation Agreement WG. First, it needs to be agreed in the RTS WG which principles we can agree on. In case RTS is to be included in the CA, the amendment procedure of the CA will be used.
BG	Bulgaria expressed support for this approach and to wait for the result of the RTS discussion.
DE	Germany reminded members of the tight time frames and urged all members to be involved and not to delay the RTS work.

On the grounds of the presentation and discussion, decisions D3/4 was taken, see section 3 of this document.

2.9 Technical and operational support

IT	Italy noted that it will be valuable to learn more about the security aspect and that NATO documentation could provide guidance. Italy offered to share their experience within the Sophia operation.
FI	Finland pointed out that standards created under the EU umbrella should be aligned, so that national authorities can create one single legacy system.

2.10 Collaborative platform and communication activities

EMSA presented an update on the use of the collaborative platform and website, and on the planned communication activities. The involvement of CISE transitional phase in the European Maritime Day in Cork on 14-15 May 2020 and the INSPIRE Conference in Dubrovnik 12-15 May 2020 was mentioned, and members were encouraged to inform EMSA about events where involvement of CISE would be beneficial for the evolution of the network.

Questions & Answers

IT	Following the presentation from EDA, Italy reminded that MARSUR is not EU financed.
EMSA	EMSA clarified that a CISE node does not store data, but it distributes data.
JRC	Mr Meersman expressed his concerns to maintain parallel systems.
EDA	EDA recalled that CISE should not replace any system but should enable interoperability between sectorial systems (MARSUR, SafeSeaNet, EUROSUR etc).
DE	Germany expressed the need to keep the MARSUR network, as there will always be information that is shared within the sector and not cross sectorial as in CISE.
DG MARE	Following EEAS's presentation, DG MARE expressed their appreciation for learning about EEAS's interest to participate in CISE, as the Commission and EEAS share the responsibility for the implementation of the EUMSS.
DE	Following EFCA's presentation, Germany reiterated the importance of information sharing and not only data sharing.
BG	Bulgaria mentioned their implementation of the CISE solution at a national level through InBulMarS, emphasizing the importance to show the added value of CISE for the customs sector.
DG MARE	Following the presentation made by Frontex, DG MARE expressed appreciation for the update on the EUROSUR implementing act and the plan to use CISE standards (data and service model) for the implementation of EUROSUR.
EMSA	EMSA asked Frontex, that had mentioned that information in EUROSUR is shared with third countries, how it can be assured that information shared in CISE will not unintentionally reach third countries.
FRONTEX	Frontex replied to EMSA that the information sharing will be regulated bilaterally.
DG MARE	DG MARE asked Frontex and EMSA if they have a plan to use CISE nodes for further evolve the exchange of information between the two Agencies.
FRONTEX	Frontex replied that this idea will be analysed

2.12 Any other business

Under this last agenda item, Germany directed a request to DG MARE to arrange a meeting with the Member State Expert Sub-Group on Maritime Security and Surveillance, as planning of the operational phase needs to start as early as possible.

DG MARE reminded that we are waiting for the results of the transitional phase which should give the right argument to move into the operational phase. In addition, the approval of the EU budget is pending. The request was noted.
