## EMSA Workshop on Ship Recycling Lisbon, 21-22 September 2006

## **Background**

In accordance with the objectives and tasks as laid down in its founding Regulation (EC) 1406/2002 (as amended), as well as under a specific mandate agreed with DG ENV, EMSA has been providing technical assistance to the European Commission on the issue of recycling of end of life vessels.

In view of recent developments at EU and global level, EMSA and the European Commission agreed that it would be opportune to organise an expert Workshop on Ship Recycling, in order to stimulate the exchange of views among Member State experts and relevant stakeholders, as well as to improve the level of information on current practices of ship recycling.

The discussion at the Workshop centred on the draft international Convention on the safe and environmentally sound recycling of ships, which is currently being developed by the International Maritime Organisation.

IMO Assembly Resolution A.981(24) requested the MEPC to develop a new legally binding instrument on ship recycling; drafting has taken place and will continue in the period 2006-2007 and the new instrument should be ready for adoption in the biennium 2008-2009. The draft Convention, prepared by Norway and further developed by the IMO working and correspondence groups on ship recycling, is based on a "cradle to grave approach" and provides regulations for design/construction of ships, operation of ship recycling facilities and certification and reporting.

At the same time, the global management of ship dismantling is under discussion in other international fora, such as the International Labour Organisation and the Basel Convention, which have provided input in the process of developing international standards for ship recycling, in particular on issues such as occupational safety and health, as well as environmentally sound management (ESM) and establishing effective control mechanisms (exchange of information, notification and reporting).

Since it will take several years before this new Convention will come into force, as well as to effectively deal with the problem of dismantling the single hull oil tankers that will be phased out between now and 2010/2015, interim measures at EU level are also being considered.

### **Workshop Objectives**

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The Workshop was divided into two sessions:

 The first session, held on <u>21 September 2006</u>, was an open session for representatives/experts from the EU Member States, EEA States, Acceding and Candidate Countries, the European Commission and stakeholder organisations, including industry and non governmental organisations;

The objective of this session was to stimulate an exchange of views on ship recycling among the participants and increase the information level on current practices at the global level.

2. The second session, held on <u>22 September 2006</u>, was restricted to representatives/experts from EU and EEA Member States, Acceding and Candidate Countries and the European Commission.

The objective of the second session was:

- to stimulate an exchange of views among EU experts and the Commission on the problems associated with ship recycling and improve the level of information on current practices at EU and national level.
- to work towards a common understanding of some of the key issues identified in the draft IMO Convention on the safe and environmentally sound management of ship recycling.

#### **Workshop Programme**

The workshop was chaired by Mr. Panagiotis Petropoulos Head of Unit D (Implementation of EU Maritime Legislation).

Mr. Thomas Ormond (European Commission, DG ENV) and Mr. Bernardo Urrutia (European Commission, DG TREN) gave a welcome address and a short introductory speech.

The 2 day workshop covered all seven issues on the agenda. Detailed minutes of the meeting are attached to this report.

#### **Workshop Conclusions**

For each session a full set of conclusions was drafted by EMSA and agreed by the participants.

### 1<sup>st</sup> session (21 September 2006)

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- 1. To effectively deal with the current problems of ship recycling, action has to be undertaken at the international level. In this context, the majority of the participants acknowledged the progress made in IMO to develop a future convention for the safe and environmentally sound recycling of ships, which provides requirements for ships, recycling facilities and a system of reporting and control, and creates a globally binding regime. To make this process in IMO a success, the following elements are of key importance:
  - ➤ Commitment from the international community to comply with the IMO;
  - time schedule for the negotiations;
  - ➤ Commitment from major ship building states, flag states and recycling states to solve the problem by taking active part in the negotiations, ratifying the adopted instrument, and establishing the control and enforcement mechanisms required by the Convention;
  - > Active participation from all other stakeholders in the negotiations;
  - Commitment from industry to implement the agreed requirements;
  - > Equal treatment of all parties in the Convention; nevertheless, some participants expressed concerns about the implications of the equal treatment principle and discussed the need of complementary measures.

The NGO platform expressed some criticism of the effectiveness of the current draft instrument.

- The relationship between the future IMO Convention and other relevant international conventions (Basel Convention and the ILO Convention and standards) will need to be clarified. Any grey areas in the existing legislation and the future legal framework should be avoided.
- 3. Participants welcomed the concept of life cycle thinking ("from cradle to grave" approach), which is at the basis of the future IMO Convention. The Inventory of hazardous materials, and the future system of survey and certification were identified as key elements of the future Convention, as well as the provision of international standards for recycling facilities.
- 4. The Workshop welcomed the voluntary commitments that were announced by representatives of the shipping industry as a potentially effective tool to improve the practices in the interim

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period. In this context, the importance of a list of authorized recycling facilities was highlighted.

5. Pre-cleaning was discussed as an important issue. The practical problems of pre-cleaning from the maritime safety point of views were stressed, as well as the need to take into account other hazardous materials on board ships, apart from asbestos.

## 2<sup>nd</sup> session – Developments at EU level 22 September 2006

- 1. All participants emphasized the need for a strong EU contribution to the development of a future IMO Convention on the safe and environmentally sound recycling of ships;
- 2. Most participants welcomed the Commission's plan to launch a public consultation on an EU contribution to better management of ship dismantling, in addition to the ongoing consultation on the Green Paper for a future EU maritime policy;
- 3. It was generally acknowledged that effective measures should be considered to cover the interim period, i.e. until the new IMO Convention has entered into force. The need for better enforcement of the EU Waste Shipment Regulation was highlighted, as well as the application of the existing Guidelines on ship recycling. In addition, the question of funding, based on the polluter pays principle, was debated;
- 4. It was pointed out that safe and environmentally sound recycling is practically achievable at a reasonable cost, provided that there is proper planning;
- 5. Participants showed willingness to work towards a common approach on key issues such as Environmentally Sound Management of ship recycling and equivalent level of control and enforcement, as established in the Basel Convention, in its entirety;
- 6. The participants agreed that well timed workshop meetings at expert level are very useful in making progress and developing common understanding. They provide the appropriate forum for an open exchange of views among all relevant stakeholders.
